Former Iranian Foreign Minister Zahedi Recognized

RAN HAS RARELY BEEN MORE CENTRAL to global af fairst han it had be come at the dawn of 2013. At the same time, it has be come — be cause of cur tailed in ter na tional ac cess and in ter nal pro pa ganda in Iran, in many ways distort ing the study of its mod ern his tory — less un der stood than at any time in his tory by those global policymakers ex pected to for mu late strat e gies with re gard to it.

In the mod ern era, the growing strate gic cen tral ity of Iran through World War II, and then par tic u larly through the Cold War, was largely re spon si ble for the sta bil ity and suc cess of West ern economies and for Western strategic dom i nance. It was, for the West, the es sence of the contain ment of the USSR, and also the es sence of a stra te gic link - age be tween the At lan tic states and the Indo-Asian states. The nu ances of geo - pol i tics changed with the end of the Cold War, and the 1979 over throw of the Shah of Iran con trib uted sig nif i - cantly to the shift in global dy nam ics. Af ter the Shah's departure, in ter na - tional per cep tions of Iran - which had es sen tially be come a closed so ci ety with the dom i nance of ex trem ist mul - lahs - re gressed to sim plis tic unidi - mensional imagery. Understanding of the enor mous depth of Persian and Iranian society, culture, history,

and geopolitical im por tance, which had been grow ing glob ally un til 1979, evaporated. Today, strategic policy to - ward Iran is be ing made by most states on the ba sis of an ig no rance which was not ev i dent during the Cold War.

What is for got ten is that some of the key play ers who un der stand Iran, and

who were in ti mately in volved in the pol i cies of the coun try and the international community during the Cold War, are still alive. Their views have not been heard for some time; their knowledge has been for got ten; their coun sel not sought.

The International Strategic Studies Association (ISSA), the publishers of Defense & For eign Affairs, made the decision in December


2012 to present the ISSA Sil ver Star Award for Out standing Contribu tions ISSA's high est honor — to for mer Ira nian For eign Minister Ardeshir Zahedi, who is now liv ing in ex ile in Swit zer land.

Mr Zahedi was For eign Min is ter of Iran un der the Shah (1966-73). He also served as Im pe rial Ira nian Ambassador to Washington on two oc ca sions, and once to the Court of St. James. He was uniquely placed, at a crit i cal time in his tory, to know key US, Eu ro pean, So-viet, Mid dle East ern, and Asian lead ers, at a time when Iran's re-emer gence as an ar - bi ter of East-West politics was crit ical.

Ardeshir Zahedi, son of soldier, tatesman, and Prime Minister, Lt.-Gen.

Fazollah Zahedi, and scion of an historically important Iranian fam ily, served not only at the right hand of his fa ther be fore, during, and after his Pre mier ship; he also was close to the Shah, and worked un til the end of the Shah's life to help pre serve sta - bil ity and pros per ity for Iran. In so doing, he met with the great world lead-ers and pol i ti cians, and has unique in sights into how policies to ward Iran de vel oped. All of this he has be - gun to me - morialize in his new four-volume Mem oirs. the first of which has been trans - lated from Farsi into English and French. That first volume in English, which ben e fits from mas sive documentary support pro vided by materials he had de clas si fied in the US and UK (with the lapse of their 30 year classification cy cle), will be reviewed in de tail in the next edi tion of Defense & For eign Affairs Strate gic Policy.

The con tents of the book even toISSA Pres. Greg ory Cop ley, who was intimately engaged in Iranian affairs during the Cold



War, and who met with the Shah and other Ira nian of ficials are explosively revealing. There is no doubt that the book, and Amb.

Zahedi's per spec tive, could play a vi tal rôle in cur rent stra te gic pol icy judg ments, as well as in shap ing the judgment of his tory. More over, his in sights will do much for the ed u ca tion of the cur rent generation of Iranians, who now have the Farsi edi tion of the book to help

over come the three de cades of revisionist edu cation in Iran. ISSA is de lighted that Amb. Zahedi has agreed to ac cept the honor of the Award, and that this dy namic dip lo mat can continue to have an impact on global policy at a time when Iran remains the central piece on the East-Westgameboard. — GRC 11-12, 2012 DEFENSE & FOREIGN AFFAIRS STRATEGIC POLICY 3.
