You threaten them and they will hit you in the mouth and break your teeth.

Iranians, throughout their long and glorious history, have always defended their honour. This is our history and our dignity. If we continue to insist that we are right and everybody else is wrong, we miss the whole point. The two sides always need

neighbours. I learnt from my father that we should keep good and friendly relations with our neighbours, love and respect them. Our king also was attached to peace and understanding between nations.



If we convince their people of our sincerity, ninety per cent of them are with us in their hearts and minds.

FS: In your view, who could be against peace between Iran and its neighbours?

AZ: Israel would not be happy to see Iran in peace with others. Israel wants to against Iran, though some are still abusing religion and provoking tensions between the Shiites and Sunnites for their own profiting from the situation.

My Oueen, Her Majesty Sunnite Fawzieh. was and no one talked or was worried about it. We had close and intimate relations with all Arab nations. We had our regular pilgrimages to Karbala and Najaf or to Mecca and Medina. Omar Saggaf, the Saudi foreign minister was like my brother. We were in constant contact and worked hand in hand on the international issues.

This is part of the three-thousand-year-old attitude and mentality of our nation. When sincerity and good will is there life becomes fruitful and pleasant.

In the old days grocery stores were rare and usually

far away. We used to go to our neighbours ask for a chicken or some meat when we had unexpected guests. The next day we would pay back by some melons or sugar in exchange. We loved and respected our

mutual respect for each other. Many of the presidents addressed me by my first name and called "Ardeshir" not His Excellency, or Ambassador or by other official titles. It is obvious that when the two sides have confidence in each other they feel close. Human kind loves peace. Those who are against this noble aspiration are either sick or simply traitors. FS:Unfortunately, the relations many neighbouring countries with us is not based on that principle.

AZ: This is not the case of all. Besides we should not confuse the attitude of governments with the desires of the people. We

expand its territory and America is behind it, supporting all its moves. We had brotherly relations with Syria. When we were at war with Saddam and he had invaded our country, Syrians came to help us. We owe them part of our victory.

Lebanon, where I had some of my education, is and has been a friendly country. Amongst the Arabs, I do not see many who would be within the remaining days of my life, but we are not far from reaching that goal and returning to the tables of brotherhood.

FS: How do you see the grature of Iran and the direction it is taking?

AZ: Iran is moving towards of a bright future with its new generation of qualified youth. Success, honour, whappiness of people,

AZ: Everyone, but those who have lost their minds. wants peace. Iran is a peace-loving nation; the Iranians know the pleasures of living a peaceful life.

FS: Let me go back to the events of 1979 and the Iranian revolution. Many Iranians still believe that Jimmy Carter, the American President, was at the origin of the fall of the Iranian Monarchy.

AZ: Look at the photo behind you.I, took the Shah's son to visit Carter in the White House. Carter had sympathy for Iran. He is a noble man. Iranians sometimes become

was surrounded by a bunch of flatterers and liars and we saw the outcome. It was the Shah himself who told the Iranian Ambassador to go and speak to Khomeini.

No, Jimmy Carter was not responsible for the fall of the Shah.

FS: Recent documents reveal that Ambassador Sullivan and Jimmy Carter were both trying to boost the morale of the Shah and that to the last moment.

AZ: That was not the case of Sullivan. I had told the Shah from the first moment that Sullivan was not a good Ambassador for Iran. He wrote back to me "We have you, do not worry." He was kind and generous in his mind, but I knew Sullivan was neither capable nor sincere. I had a long meeting

over a private lunch with him before he was sent to

Iran. I was convinced we should not approve of his nomination.

We should remember that the situation in Iran deteriorated rapidly. There were many who wanted to do everything possible to help us. President Carter called the Shah personally to support him. This is what I know and believe in. If there be some who think otherwise and if they have any documents to prove, let them come forth and speak. I told the Shah

his attitude. I knew all about him and tried to bring it to the Shah's attention. You can even see in the documents that Carter was considering to dismiss him. After some fifty years we have access to these files, they are mostly declassified. I repeat again that I believe Jimmy carter liked Iran and the Iranians. Maybe at the start of his Presidency he did not have enough experience but we saw him come, at his own initiative and at the crucial moments of our history, to Iran to express

their good will towards us.
